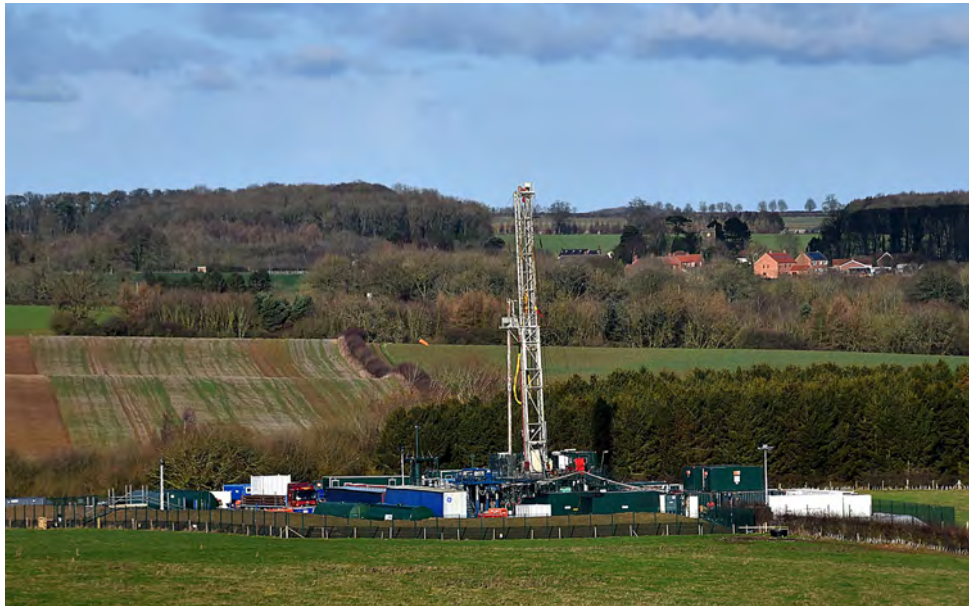
The PC will be hosting various open events for you to meet and share your views.

CAROLYN'S GARDEN TIPS

Summer wouldn't be summer without the sight of birds and insects busily roaming the air, making the most of the good weather (I'm not necessarily referring to Britain in that statement...). Fond memories are invoked of being a child chasing the elusive butterflies just to catch a glimpse of the interesting patterns & colours on their wings.



Butterflies are not only very attractive and joyful sight in the garden, but good pollinators (let's push aside the issue of caterpillar damage!) They are attracted to plants by scent rather than colour; as scent can mimic the pheromones of other Butterflies. Many plants produce scent in the evening or at night, hence aiding detection by butterflies & moths, rather than relying on flower colour to attract them. Some plants that attract butterflies are Buddleja, Lilac, Honeysuckle, Sedum spectabile, Viola, Lychnis, Golden rod, Forget-Me-Not, Dianthus, as well as the herbs Oregano, Lavender, Alpine strawberries & Hyssop.

Creating a garden with a good range of plants offering a variety of colour, scent, flowering times & habitats can not only mean having an attractive beautiful garden (with some edible yummys), but a haven for wildlife.

(Always ensure plants are correctly identified and safe to eat).

Thwing & Octon Playground was opened in 2000, and was designed to last 15 years – it is now 25 years old. Despite many equipment repairs and renewals it is now deemed unsafe to use.

The three main safety failures are the safety loose fill wood chip, excessive wear of chains, and main structure timbers that are rotten or splitting. The repair/ replacement of this alone would cost thousands of pounds and would only be a short term fix, even if funds were available.

The management of the playground requires constant fund-raising to cover insurance, maintenance and repair of the equipment, the grounds and fencing. It also involves the help of committed volunteers to carry out the above.

A survey was carried out with 600 forms distributed in Thwing and three other surrounding villages – only 16 were returned, with nearly half of these being from children. The full summary of this survey can be viewed at:

The amount of use and interest in the playground is not sufficient to warrant further work or investment. This Playground is therefore closed and under the terms of The Tenancy Agreement the equipment is to be taken down and removed, and the land returned to its owners as grassland.

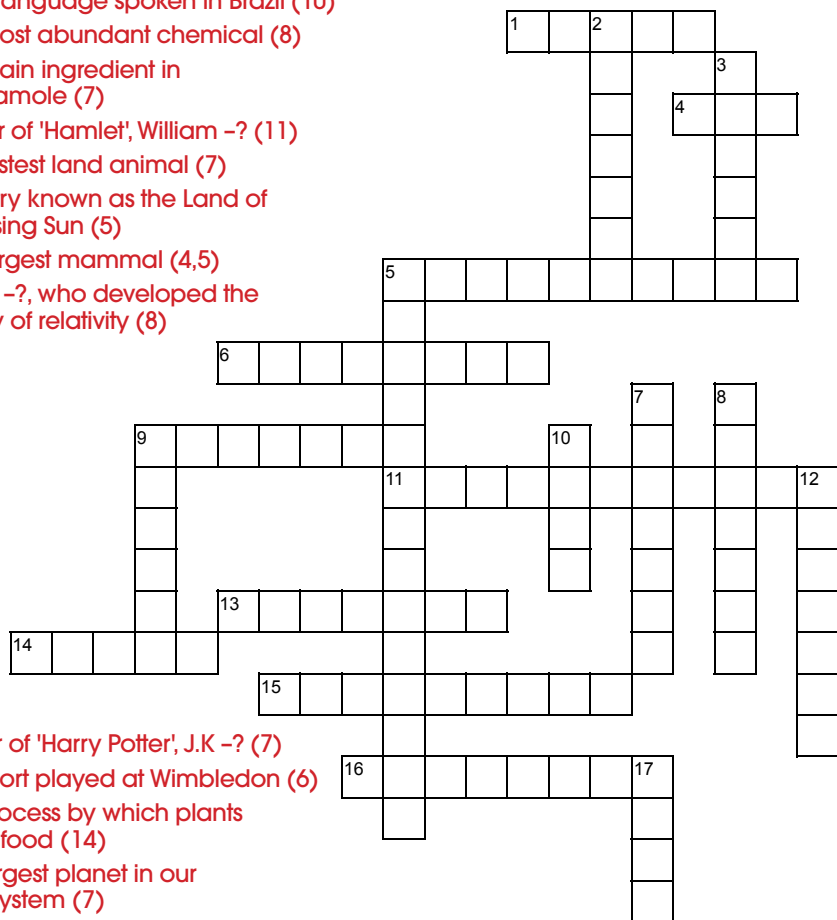

HISTORIC TALES OF OCTON, SWAYTHORPE, RUDSTON & THWING:

Endurance and Memory in a Landscape of Loss and Legacy

The East Yorkshire Wolds are home to small villages with deep historical roots and rich folklore. Four such East Wold villages – Octon, Swaythorpe, Rudston, and Thwing – offer a fascinating glimpse into the region's past, from ancient monoliths and medieval chapels to lost villages and local legends. What follows is a journey through their notable history, landmarks, and cultural lore, highlighting how each connects to the broader heritage of the Yorkshire Wolds.

Octon and Swaythorpe: Lost Medieval Villages

Octon is today a quiet hamlet, but it appears in the 1086 Domesday Book (recorded as "Ocheton") and once had a medieval chapel dedicated to St. Michael. By the early 14th century, Octon was a modest farming community. This shrunken medieval village later dwindled, likely due to the Black Death plague in the 14th century. After about 1400, no further records of the chapel exist, suggesting the village suffered severe depopulation. Indeed, by 1823, Octon had been reduced to a few families (three farmers and a gamekeeper) with a couple more farmers at nearby Octon Grange. The medieval village's footprint remains visible: earthworks of the old chapel and house foundations still lie in the fields, protected today as a scheduled ancient monument. Notably, Octon retains a rare 17th-century cruck-framed longhouse (an old farmhouse at Glebe Farm), one of the oldest surviving farmhouses of its kind in the East Riding. This rustic building is a tangible link to Octon's post-medieval rebuilding, when many Wolds farmhouses were constructed in the 1600s.

Swaythorpe, by contrast, is a village that virtually vanished. Historically associated

with Thwing parish, Swaythorpe was largely depopulated during the 14th-century plague years and never recovered. By the 17th century, documents describe Swaythorpe's site merely as "sheep pasture" – an abandoned medieval settlement turned grazing land. Today it consists of just a single large farmstead. However, if you walk through its fields, you can still discern the ancient outlines: grassy mounds and platforms marking former houses, as well as the old village church's foundation. For those curious to explore Octon's past, the Thwing & Octon Parish Council heritage trail offers a guided walk through its surviving landscape and stories.



Rudston: The Monolith and the Myth

The medieval village of Rudston is recorded in the Domesday Book (1086) as "Rodestane." Throughout the Middle Ages, Rudston evolved into one of the oldest continuously inhabited villages in England, with a heritage spanning over four millennia of Yorkshire history.

Rudston is a village renowned for the Rudston Monolith, a massive standing stone over 25 feet (7.6 m) high – the tallest of its kind in the United Kingdom. This ancient

pillar of gritstone towers in the All Saints' churchyard, and archaeologists believe it dates from the late Neolithic or early Bronze Age (around 2000 BC).



The monolith's presence suggests that the site was a significant pre-Christian holy place. Indeed, the very name Rudston is thought to mean "rood-stane" or "cross-stone," implying that Anglo-Saxon missionaries fixed a cross atop the revered stone to consecrate it for Christian use. It is no coincidence that a Norman church was later built here, incorporating the prehistoric monolith into its churchyard. A colourful local myth even claims the Devil himself threw this great stone in anger: angered by a church rising on his pagan hill, the Devil hurled a gigantic stone javelin to demolish it, but divine intervention deflected the missile to where it stands today!

Thwing: High Wolds Heritage and Folklore

Thwing sits atop the high Wolds and has been an "ancient village" since at least Saxon times. The name Thwing is thought to derive from Old Scandinavian – possibly meaning a "strip of high land" – befitting its ridge-top location. Another theory links the name to an Old Norse word for "to speak," suggesting that Thwing might have once been a local meeting place. The village today clusters at the head of a dry valley (Syn Dale), and together with Octon it forms a long parish bounded by the Gypsy Race valley to the north and an old Roman road (now the B1253) to the south. Thwing's parish church, All Saints', dates to the 12th century and still retains

Norman architectural features in its walls and doorways.

Beyond its history, Thwing is rich in folklore, and the landscape itself invites legend. On the eastern boundary of the parish stands Willy Howe, a large, tree-topped Neolithic round barrow (ancient burial mound) approximately 25 feet high.

At least two antiquarians excavated Willy Howe in the 19th century (hoping to find buried treasure), but it was empty, leading locals to spin supernatural tales to explain its secrets. In a famous legend recorded by William of Newburgh in the 12th century, a man walking by Willy Howe one moonlit night heard strange laughter coming from within the hill. He discovered a hidden door and saw fairies feasting and dancing. Offered a drink from an elegant goblet, he remembered the warning that consuming anything in Fairyland could trap a mortal, so he poured it out and fled, stealing the goblet. The fairies chased him but could not cross the Gypsy Race stream, allowing him to escape. The enchanted goblet eventually ended up in the King of England's treasury, and the doorway to Willy Howe was lost forever.

Connecting Past and Present

Though humble in size, Octon, Swaythorpe, Rudston, and Thwing offer a rich tapestry of Yorkshire heritage. Their medieval foundations (each was noted in Domesday) and later chapters – whether the abandonment of Swaythorpe, the perseverance of Thwing, or the remarkable artifacts of Rudston – illustrate the ebbs and flows of rural life in the East Riding. The landmarks that survive, from All Saints' churches to Bronze Age barrows, link these villages to the wider story of the Wolds as a cradle of settlement and spirituality across ages. And the enduring legends keep local history alive and vivid for each new generation. In these East Wold villages, history isn't just found in textbooks; it's inscribed in the very landscape and echoed in the tales passed down, making the past a living, shared memory in the community.

THE RECIPE BOOK

GRANOLA

Ingredients:

1/2 cup olive oil
1/2 cup maple syrup
1/2 tsp salt
1 tsp vanilla
1 cup walnuts
1 cup pecans
1 cup sunflower seeds
1 cup pumpkin seeds
6 cups large porridge oats

Essential kit:

Mixing bowl

Method:

Turn on oven to 160°

In a large mixing bowl stir together oil and syrup.

Add salt and vanilla and stir well.

Mix in walnuts and pecans.

Carefully stir in oats, ensuring all are coated.

Line a large flat baking tray with greaseproof paper.

Bake in oven for 35 mins.

Allow to cool completely.

Store in an airtight container in a cool place.

FORK BISCUITS

Now that the school holidays are here, there's a simple tasty treat that is easy for children to make – Mary Berry's fork biscuits.

Quick, easy and delicious and can be made with minimal fuss!

Ingredients:

100g (4oz) butter, softened
50g (2oz) caster sugar
150g (5oz) self-raising flour

Essential kit:

You will need two baking trays.

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180°C /fan 160°C/ gas 4.

Lightly butter two baking trays.

Measure the butter into a bowl and beat to soften.

Gradually beat in the sugar and then the flour.

Bring the mixture together with your hands to form a dough. I always knead the dough several times as I feel it makes a crisper biscuit. The kids will love doing this!

Form the dough into 16 balls about the size of a walnut and place spaced well apart on the prepared baking trays.

Dip a fork in a little water and use this to flatten the biscuits.

Bake in the preheated oven for 15–20 minutes until a very pale golden.

Lift off the baking tray and leave to cool completely on a wire rack.

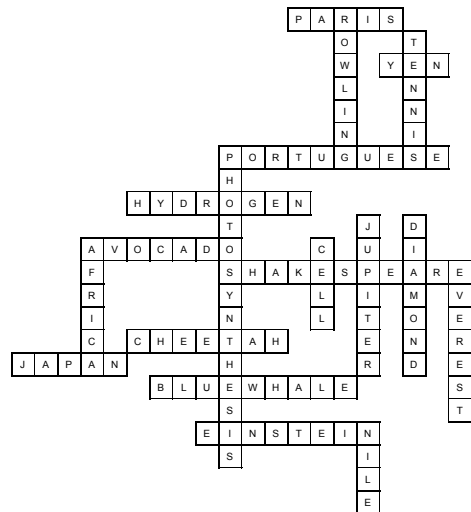

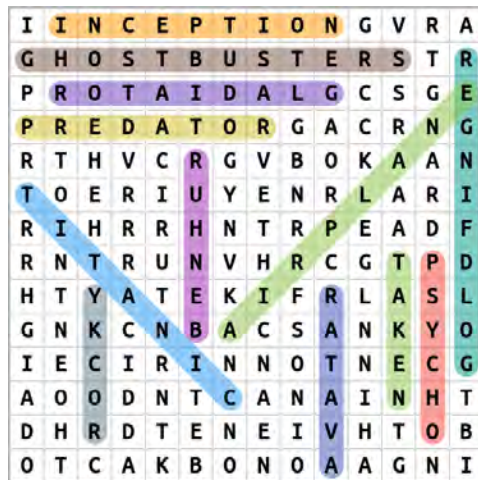
