HELP HEDGEHOGS HIBERNATE



As autumn fades and the nights grow colder, hedgehogs across the East Wolds are busy preparing for one of the toughest tests of the year: hibernation. By November, most are searching for dry, safe places to curl up until spring. But with tidy gardens and early bonfire piles, finding shelter isn't always easy. A little help from us can make all the difference.

Why hibernation matters

Hedgehogs hibernate to survive the cold months when insects and worms are scarce. They need to build up enough fat reserves and find a snug, undisturbed nest before temperatures drop. It takes a lot of energy to stay warm, as they evolved quills for defence rather than fur for insulation.

Creating a hedgehog-friendly garden

One of the simplest ways to help is to leave parts of your garden a little wild. Piles of leaves, logs or brushwood make perfect nesting sites. Avoid strimming long grass, and if you're tidying up borders, consider leaving a quiet corner untouched. If you prefer a neater look, purpose-built hedgehog houses or wooden boxes are easy to make or buy. Place them in sheltered, dry spots away from foot traffic, pets or wheelie bins. Against a wall, fence or under a hedge or bush is ideal. Face the entrance away from prevailing wind and rain. To be extra helpful, place the house near nesting materials such as leaves, straw, hay, or twigs.

Feeding before winter

Hedgehogs need to be well-fed before they settle down. Offer meaty cat or dog food (wet or dry) and fresh water in shallow dishes. Alternatives include minced meat, chopped boiled eggs, or specialist hedgehog food. For one hedgehog, around 100 grams of food per night is enough. Avoid milk, bread, cakes, biscuits, and salty snacks like crisps, which can make them ill. Feeding through October and early November helps late youngsters (autumn juveniles) build enough weight to survive hibernation. Between December and March, hedgehogs may occasionally wake up and need a small top-up. A supply of dry biscuits and water can be a lifesaver, especially if the ground is frozen.

Bonfire Night warning



Bonfire piles are irresistible to hedgehogs looking for shelter. If you're celebrating Bonfire Night, always build your bonfire on the day you plan to light it, or move an existing pile in its entirety before setting it ablaze. Check the base carefully with a torch or a long stick to make sure no animals have moved in. Compost heaps and log piles can also attract nesting hedgehogs, so take care when turning or moving them.

When to call for help

If you spot a small hedgehog (under 450 grams) out in the cold or during the day in late autumn, it may need help. Contact a local wildlife rescue, such as Wolds Hedgehog Rescue in Driffield, for advice rather than trying to overwinter it yourself. Though well-meant, untrained care can do more harm than good. Rescues can assess, weigh and monitor hedgehogs before deciding whether they're ready for release or need temporary care.

A little effort, a big reward

Sadly, hedgehog numbers continue to fall, largely due to habitat loss and environmental hazards, so every small act of care counts.

Every safe garden corner, every checked bonfire, and every dish of water helps our prickly neighbours make it through the winter. With a bit of thought, we can ensure the East Wolds stays a place where hedgehogs still snuffle through the leaves each spring.

LANGTOFT PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Langtoft Parish Council celebrates after receiving £20,000 of National Lottery funding to install a ninja trail at our playground.



Langtoft Parish Council is celebrating after being awarded almost £20,000 in National Lottery funding to support its work with children in the community. The council, based in East Riding of Yorkshire, will use the money to provide

extra play equipment for children of all ages and abilities.

The new equipment will be installed at the existing play area, enhancing the pieces that are already available, encouraging families and children to use the facilities, make friends, learn new skills and have fun. Physical play, while enjoyable, helps children to gain greater confidence, self-belief and important collaboration skills.

The new funding from The National Lottery Community Fund, which distributes money raised by National Lottery players for good causes and is the largest community funder in the UK, will enable more children to enjoy fresh air and exercise. At the same time, it supports children's parents and enables them to build relationships with others, sharing experiences and the challenges that being a parent can bring and hopefully enable them to develop their own supportive network.

Langtoft Parish Council's Clerk, says: "We're delighted that The National Lottery Community Fund has recognised our work in this way. 

CAROLYN'S GARDEN TIPS

Bums in the air!

There's no time to sit on your laurels (painful?) in the garden yet! Now is a great time for planting bulbs for Spring colour. You can produce colour in the garden all year with bulbs; they take minimum effort to plant & look after, so are a real winner.

Whatever you choose to plant, check the packet they come in for their height, flowering period & planting instructions. For planting depth, a general rule is to plant the bulb twice as deep as its own depth. Planting clusters or drifts of bulbs give areas of



intense colour, rather than dotting them far apart. You can plant bulbs in containers also; they are great for using to fill in gaps or bare areas in the garden.either temporarily or to give height (in taller **Planting** containers). bulbs with a variety of heights, flowering periods & flower/leaf shapes can give an attractive display on their own, but try planting them amonast low shrubs or even shorter varieties in winter hanging baskets.

Bulbs do well under trees, as they store food in the bulb to enable them to sustain themselves whilst emerging. They flourish before the tree canopy appears, so they get sun to photosynthesise & put food back into the bulb for next year.

As well as the usual Daffodils & Tulips try *Eranthis hyemalis* for bright yellow flowers & an interesting ruffle of leaf below; *Fritillaria imperialis* for height & bright colours, *Oxalis triangularis* for its gorgeous plum colored foliage, or *Oxalis versicolor* for candy striped flowers.

Just a note regarding pets, children or curios wayward adults! - Always check that whatever you plant, not just bulbs, are safe for those using the garden. Plus, treat yourself to a kneeling pad to use when planting, bad backs are no fun. Happy planting!

Be Their Calm In The Chaos: Protect The Animals This Bonfire Night

Bonfire Night is for people, but for many animals it's a night of fear. The RSPCA warns that fireworks often cause "fear. anxiety, increased stress levels and even injury or death" in pets, horses, livestock and wildlife.

Here's what you can do to keep animals safe:

1: CREATE A SAFE HAVEN

Set up a quiet room or space with favourite blankets, toys and water.

calm music or a TV to mask the bangs.

Never let your dog or cat roam freely outside during firework times as panic can lead to escape, injury, or death.

2: ADJUST ROUTINES NOW

Walk dogs early in daylight when

fireworks are less likely.

Bring outdoor pets inside or cover their enclosures to reduce surprise flashes and noise.

Make sure all pets are micro-chipped and wearing ID tags since frightened animals may bolt.

3: BE A FIREWORK-FRIENDLY **NEIGHBOUR**

Plan your display away from livestock, rural homes or stables.

Consider quieter alternatives (laser/ Close curtains and windows, turn on LED or drone shows) or set off fewer fireworks to reduce disruption.

> Attend public community displays instead of private ones, which will reduce the amount of firework noise and the detrimental impact on nearby animals.





DID YOU KNOW?

With *The East Wolds Community Newsletter* covering a variety of villages, Adam Kelly decided to investigate the various areas for interesting facts - this issue he looks at Langtoft, Octon and Rudston.

LANGTOFT

- Langtoft has experienced several disasters as far back as 1657. One notable instance was the flood of July 1892, when water in the streets rose to 7.5 feet.

from the deserted village of Cottam.


OCTON

- Thomas Lamplugh (right) was born in Octon in 1615. A Fellow of Queen's College, Oxford, he went on to become Dean of Rochester, Bishop of Exeter, and Archbishop of York. A memorial to Lamplugh can be found in the south choir aisle of York Minster.
- In 1327, Sir William de Thwenge (Thwing) founded a chantry in the chapel of St Michael at Octon, where Mass was to be offered for the soul of his father, Sir Marmaduke Thwenge, himself, and their ancestors. Though the chapel no longer exists, its outline can still be seen.



RUDSTON

- The Rudston Monolith in the All Saints churchyard is a massive standing stone over 25 feet (7.6 metres) high, and is the tallest of its kind in the United Kingdom.
- The monolith is estimated to weigh between 25 and 46 tons.
- There are three similar large stones at Boroughbridge known as the 'Devil's Arrows'.
- Winifred Holtby, the Yorkshire novelist who wrote The Land of Green Ginger and South Riding, was born at Rudston in 1898.
 Her grave can be found in the All Saints churchyard.
- The name "Rudston" is thought to mean "rood-stane" or "cross-stone".



 In 1838, a Roman villa was discovered in Rudston. In 1933, the famous Venus mosaic was found by landowner and farmer H. Robson while ploughing. Mosaics from the site are now displayed at the Hull and East Riding Museum.





THE RECIPE BOOK

FRUIT CAKE

This is a recipe from the Good Food archive. As I've used it over the years, I've swapped and changed the ingredients. I've sometimes replaced the mixed peel with apricots or cranberries or a mix, depending on what I've got in the cupboard. It's an easy cake and for me it has been a go to!

Ingredients:

125g unsalted butter cubed, plus extra for the tin

175g light brown soft sugar

200g raisins

200g sultanas

100g currants 50g mixed peel

225q self-raising flour

1½ tsp mixed spice

½ tsp bicarbonate of soda

2 eggs beaten

Essential kit:

Loaf tin, large bowl, wire rack

Method:

Heat the oven to 160C/140C fan/gas 3.

Butter and line a 900g loaf tin with baking parchment.

Melt the sugar, butter and 225ml water in a large saucepan.

Once melted, add the raisins, sultanas, currants and mixed peel.

Bring to a gentle boil, and stirring occasionally, cook until reduced and softened, around 10-15 mins.

Remove from the heat and leave to cool to room temperature.

Tip the flour, mixed spice, bicarbonate of soda and a pinch of salt into a large bowl.

Add the cooled fruit mixture and stir, then add the eggs and mix to combine. Bake for 45-55 mins until dark brown and a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean.

Leave to cool in the tin for 10 mins, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Cut into slices to serve.
