





There is also the white rabbit carving in St. Mary's church in Beverley, but there is no evidence Carroll ever visited the town. There is however a carving on a misericord of a rabbit vanishing down a hole in Ripon Cathedral where Carroll did visit.

Sadly the little lad died before he was a year old, his death certificate, which I now own, reads "cause of death 22nd August, teething". Carroll attended his funeral in the church yard, it was possibly his last visit to Bridlington.

Rev. Skeffington and his wife sadly moved to Voychurch parish in Herefordshire where he died in 1910.



Isabella, his wife, did return to her home town and died in 1937. She is buried in the Cooper vault at Bridlington Priory.

Did Bridlington seaside inspire Carroll's poem Walrus and the Carpenter? The red rose staves are still there in a Yorkshire church at Burton Agnes and Carroll's "Duchess" is still to be found carved in stone on the West front of the Bridlington Priory church. His sister-in-law and his nephew namesake lie buried in the church yard. Lewis Carroll died of pneumonia in January 1898, aged 65, in Guilford, but some claim he had a leaking gas fire in his rooms.

In 1995, three friends and I took on the onerous task of recording every memorial at the Bridlington Priory and discovered Carroll's nephew and sister-in-law. I visited Carroll's grave in Surrey, only now can I tell of his time in Bridlington and the East Riding.

DID YOU KNOW?

With *The East Wolds Community Newsletter* covering a variety of villages, Adam Kelly decided to investigate the various areas for interesting facts - starting with Burton Fleming.

- In 1643, Queen Henrietta Maria wife of Charles I sought refuge in Burton Fleming while transporting arms during the English Civil War.
- The village appears in the Domesday Book as "Burtone". Fleming likely refers to settlers from Flanders, the "Flemish Region" of Belgium.
- About one-third of East Yorkshire villages are named after Viking settlements.
 Approximately 120 were of Anglo-Saxon origin, ending in "-ton" (enclosure).
 "Burton" meant a fortified village.
- The mysterious stream running through Burton Fleming is known as the Gypsey Race. Locals once believed it foretold disaster in 1914 and 1939, it flowed unusually strong before both World Wars.
- According to local historians, the 1776 Race flood forced



- the re-siting of the Burton Fleming-Foxholes road, likely caused by a rare surge in the mysterious Gypsey Race stream.
- "Gypsey" may derive from gypa (Norse) a gushing stream; or it may have been likened to a gipsy wanderer.
- "Scrambling" was often performed on the morning of the first working day
 of the New Year. In Driffield, children would "scramble" outside of shops for
 coins, apples, nuts, etc. that were thrown amongst them.

- The Burton Fleming crossroads is home to a unique, two-handled long case water pump called "Black Jack". Water pumps, aka parish or pitcher pumps, were used to provide clean water to communities before the introduction of domestic piped water systems.
- It was once a local wedding custom at Burton
 Fleming church to tie together the lych gates
 during the ceremony. Before the bride and groom
 could leave, the groom or best man had to scatter
 enough small change for the children waiting
 outside to agree to cut the string. This custom likely
 originated from the practice of "Scrambling".



In 2017, Burton Fleming declared itself a "hedgehog friendly village", in an attempt to tackle the mammal's declining population. According to a 2015 report by the People's Trust for Endangered Species, the rural hedgehog population had decreased by 50% since 2000. THE RECIPE BOOK

BACON AND EGG FLAN

Ingredients:

1 pkt ready made short crust pastry

2 pkts bacon lardons

1/2 onion

2 eggs

1/4 pint milk

2 large handfuls mature cheese

Salt and pepper

Olive oil for frying

Essential kit:

Flan dish

Method:

Turn on oven 180°

Line a flan dish with pastry and prick bottom with fork.

Cover with greaseproof paper.

Fill flan dish with baking beans.

Put flan dish in fridge to chill.

Peel and chop onion fry in oil until transparent drain on kitchen paper set aside.

Fry bacon until crispy drain on kitchen paper set aside.

Take flan dish out of fridge and bake blind for 15 mins.

In a mixing jug mix together eggs milk and salt and pepper to taste.

Take flan dish out of oven and very carefully remove beans and greaseproof paper.

Layer cooked onions over pastry followed by bacon.

Carefully pour over milk and eggs.

Sprinkle over cheese.

Cook for 20 to 25 minutes flan should be golden brown and just set to touch.

We all like a recipe that can use up a glut of fruit or we can whip up quickly.

I took this recipe from my Stéphane Reynaud's book that I have used lots of times. It gives you a recipe for every day of the year, using great fresh ingredients. I don't think you have to use the most expensive stuff, just use ingredients you like and the best you can afford.

Ingredients:


300 g (10½ oz) frozen fruit pieces 50 g (1¾ oz/¼ cup) sugar 1 egg white

Preparation Time:

5 minutes

Method:

The ideal is to make one's own frozen fruit during their peak season. Peaches, raspberries, strawberries, figs, pineapple ... cut them into small cubes and freeze them on a tray so that each cube is separate. Purée the frozen fruit with the sugar and the egg white* until the texture is creamy. Serve immediately.

A planning application has been submitted for a temporary gas wellsite north of Butt Lane, Foxholes.

Our small North Yorkshire parish, the villages of Foxholes and Butterwick, has voted overwhelmingly to oppose Egdon Resources' gas drilling plans.

Why?

Because the proposal is to drill straight through a principal chalk aquifer, a vital source of clean drinking water for 900,000 people across the region, all in the search for gas.

We believe this puts our health, landscape, and future at risk.

Here are just some of the reasons we've said NO:

- 1. Protecting our water & food security
- 2. The precautionary principle don't risk what you can't replace
- 3. Threats to the rare chalk stream, the Gypsey Race
